A progress update from our Digital Leaders

As part of Digital Leaders, one of the projects we did earlier this year was the creation and launch of Coding Club. A team of Digital Leaders created a space where Year 7 and 8 pupils can develop their coding skills and have an environment where they can receive support with their digital abilities. We also bought some robots to show off the possibilities of how software and hardware can be combined. Another thing that we have done is apply for the Promethean grant, an annual competition where schools create a video in which they explain their need for a promethean whiteboard and the top entries receive a free promethean whiteboard; we entered and won! It is now in use in M10. Finally, last year our team promoted the use of Kahoot. We spent several weeks familiarizing ourselves with it before leading a datagathering assembly for the current Year 8's and 9's, and then led a training session for teachers in which we taught them how to use Kahoot. We have also trained and supported teachers in the use of their interactive whiteboards and other digital tools.



Digital Safety

Phishing refers to the malicious attempt to steal your personal data, usually by pretending to represent a reputable organisation. Phishing is often attempted by sending a malicious email.

You can reduce the risk of falling susceptible to malicious emails by following these simple guidelines.

- · Check where the email is: if it has reached your spam or junk folder there is usually a good reason why.
- Who is it from? Do they normally email you? Is this email expected? Does the email address really belong to who it says it does - check online to see if this email address is registered to the company it claims.
- · What is the content of the email? Are there any spelling mistakes? Does it make sense?
- Don't open links from an email which you think is suspicious.
